Erik Bucy, Texas Tech University *Panel A: Measuring Debate Effects*

Erik Bucy is the Marshall and Sharleen Formby Regents Professor of Strategic Communication in the College of Media and Communication at Texas Tech University. He teaches and conducts research on disinformation, visual communication, and public opinion about the press. Bucy is the author of *Image Bite Politics: News and the Visual Framing of Elections* (with Maria Grabe, 2009) and editor of the *Sourcebook for Political Communication Research* (with R. Lance Holbert, 2013). Bucy is editing a special issue on visual politics for the *International Journal of Press/Politics*. He has held fellowships at the London School of Economics and Oxford University.



Timothy Betts, University of South Florida *Panel E: Trump Rallies and the Media*

Timothy Betts is a doctoral student at the University of South Florida where he studies Organizational Communication. His work examines the communicative construction and organization of economic systems, institutions, and political economy. His Master's Degree is from Texas Christian University.



Bo Blew, Purdue University *Panel D: Understanding Gender and Opinions on Elite Behavior*

Bo Blew is a PhD candidate in history at Purdue University. His work explores the influence of private foundations in public policy debates since 1968. This work is part of a larger dissertation project that uses debates on energy policy, education policy, and healthcare as lens to understand the growth of foundations as institutions of state administration. By uncovering the role of foundations in recent American history, this dissertation promises to break new scholarly ground by demonstrating the intersection between tax policy, political activism, and the policy-making process across the political spectrum.



Nadia Brown, Purdue UniversityPanel B: Members of Congress Speaking Out

Nadia E. Brown is a University Scholar and Associate Professor of Political Science and African American Studies at Purdue University. She specializes in Black women's politics and holds a graduate certificate in Women's and Gender Studies. Her research interests lie broadly in identity politics, legislative studies, and Black women's studies. Brown's *Sisters in the Statehouse: Black Women and Legislative Decision Making* (Oxford University Press, 2014) has been awarded the National Conference of Black Political Scientists' 2015 W.E.B DuBois Distinguished Book Award, 2015 Anna Julia Cooper Award from the Association for the Study of Black Women and Politics, and the 2015 Center for Research on Diversity and Inclusion at Purdue University Faculty Research Award.

Stephanie Brown, West Chester University of Pennsylvania *Panel C: Congressional Rhetoric*

Stephanie Brown is a Visiting Assistant Professor of Media and Culture in the Department of Communication and Media Studies at West Chester University of Pennsylvania. Her main areas of research include the intersection of identity and power in comedy, particularly stand-up and satire, and popular media industries and fandom. Her work has appeared in *Studies in American Humor, Transformative Works and Cultures,* and *Feminist Media Histories*.



David A. Frank, University of Oregon *Panel E: Trump Rallies and the Media*

David Frank is a Professor of Rhetoric in the Robert D. Clark Honors College at the University of Oregon. The author and coauthor of six books and 50 journal articles, he studies the use of rhetoric and argumentative reason in value conflicts. He writes and teaches courses on rhetorical history and theory, civil rights rhetoric, the Israeli-Palestinian relationship, and the prevention of genocide and mass atrocities. David Frank has received research awards alone and in collaboration with colleagues from the Mellon Foundation, the Stanley Foundation, the National Endowment for the Humanities, the National Science Foundation, and the Korea Research Foundation.

Her research interests focus on congressional legislative behavior, congressional campaigns, representation, and political polarization. 

GUEST SPEAKERS



Brian LambFounder and Former CEO, C-SPAN

Brian Lamb is the founder of the C-SPAN Networks. On March 19, 1979, with just four employees, C-SPAN transmitted a live feed from the U.S. House of Representatives, the first day the House allowed television coverage. Predating CNN and ESPN, C-SPAN offers long-form programming of events in their entirety. Its format also allows viewers to question their elected officials on its over 1,100 hours of call-in programs each year. Brian Lamb served as C-SPAN's CEO from 1979 through 2012 and continued to serve as its executive chairman until 2020. In 2011, the Department of Communication at Purdue was renamed the Brian Lamb School of Communication in his honor.



Kathryn Cramer BrownellPurdue University
Department of History

Kathryn Cramer Brownell is an Associate Professor of History at Purdue University and co-editor of Made By History at the Washington Post. Her research and teaching focus on the intersections between media, politics, and popular culture, with a particular emphasis on the American presidency. Her first book, *Showbiz Politics: Hollywood in American Political Life* (University of North Carolina Press, 2014), examines the institutionalization of entertainment styles and structures in American politics and the rise of the celebrity presidency. She is now working on a new book project about the political history of cable television from the Nixon administration through the Clinton years.
